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6. Authors' affiliation and contact details should be included in a first footnote with the symbol "*" at the end of the Author's name. Acknowledgments are to be placed in the same footnote.
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STYLE GUIDELINES

1. The layout of title, section (sub-) headings, footnotes, and quotations should conform to the following guidelines:

Body Text: Times New Roman, 11pt, justified, single spaced. Indent the first line of any subsequent paragraph, 0.5 cm from the margin, Widow and Orphan Control activated. Quotations of 60 words or more should be set indented, 9pt, single spaced, and without quotation marks. Insert a line space above and below the quotation.

Title: Times New Roman, 12pt, single spaced, all in upper case and centred

Abstract: Times New Roman, 9pt, single space, no indentation.

1st level Headings: Times, 12pt, bold, left-aligned, preceded by 2 lines space, and followed by 1 line space

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References: Times, 9pt, single spaced. Only cited works should be included in the reference list.

2. Double quotation marks should be used for any quoted material that appears within the body of the text. Single quotation marks should be used for quotes within quotes.

3. Citations in the text must conform to the following examples:

- Freud (1899) defined a dream as...
- According to dream theory (Freud 1899)...
- Kernberg (1981, p. 35) maintains that...
- “In some contexts, a functional analysis provides an appropriate answer to a request for an explanation.” (Canfield 1964, p. 285)
- Canfield writes: “In some contexts, a functional analysis provides an appropriate answer to a request for an explanation.” (1964, p. 285)
- Canfield (1964) writes: “In some contexts, a functional analysis provides an appropriate answer to a request for an explanation.” (p. 285)
- Katzenbach and Smith (1993) define a team as...
- One such study (Dickson *et al.* 1975) led to the complete sequencing...
- Dickson *et al.* (1975) studied the use of...

4. Italic font, rather than underlines, should be used for titles, emphases, etc.

5. The first time a person’s name is used in the text, his or her first name and any middle initial should also be given.

6. Symbolic letters, whether in an equation or in the text, are italicized. Numbers in equations and in symbolic terms in the text are not italicized, even if they are subscripts or superscripts.

7. Diagrams, figures, graphs, and tables should also be sent as a separate Microsoft Word or Excel file and should appear in the text at the appropriate point, numbered consecutively as in the following example:

8. References should be listed at the end of the text under the heading 'References'. They should list the Authors' last names in alphabetical order and each Author's publications should be listed in chronological order. References should conform to the following examples:
